I HAVE MY FRIENDS AND FAMILY TO HELP ME

When I was 24 my husband was killed in an accident. My life was altered dramatically. I had my family to console me, and my friends to distract me.

Yet ultimately, I walked the path to wholeness alone. I could have used a Stephen Minister.

Three years later I was told that I would never conceive a child. Again my family helped me and my friends comforted me, but this was definitely something that was my very own struggle. I could have used a Stephen Minister.

When God blessed me with my current husband, we decided to adopt a child and pursued many options. We were turned away from agencies because there are many years between us, so we tried to adopt openly. After six relationships with pregnant women, we found the one woman who would make our family complete. On the day we were to receive our new son, his birthmother changed her mind and we ended our search. Again I was devastated by loss, but I had my husband to comfort me, when he wasn't in need of comfort himself, and we had our friends who all had children. I could have used a Stephen Minister

Last year my parents died within 3 weeks of each other. My pastor helped, my friends sent cards and called or visited, my family offered their support. It was not enough. I could have used a Stephen Minister.

Life is full of broken moments, and my hurting times are no worse than others. I know there will be more difficult times ahead, but I will ask for a Stephen Minister to walk with me and manifest the love that I know God has for me.

So when my family grieves with me but realize they cannot remove the pain, my Stephen Minister will help me speak about the pain.

When my friends try to distract me but tire of hearing the same stories that I need to tell, my Stephen Minister will lovingly listen with the ears of Christ.

When my faith is tested by questions of "Why did this happen?" my Stephen Minister will sit and offer quiet prayers on my behalf

Stephen Ministry has been around since 1975 and is actively helping people in all 50 states, and 24 other countries with over 500,000 Stephen Ministers. The Stephen

each time there is an event in our lives that turns our world upside down, and we realize that it is only through the cross of Christ that we are made whole. The logo can also represent the Stephen Minister after enduring his or her own brokenness, can now help another broken person with Christ at the center of the relationship.

Our Stephen Ministers have gone through extensive training, and offer their time, knowledge, and unconditional love and care for their care receivers. They are living the Gospel, and are ready to serve you at any time. SS. EDWARD & LUCY YOUTH GROUP: MY THOUGHTS & REFLECTIONS

Youth Group. The phrase brings with it many connotations. Teenagers, High School Students, Drama, Emotion, Fun, Energy, Spirituality... What is a Youth Group? Really, what does it mean? What does it take to create one, to continue one, to offer it as a parish?

Across our country many parishes suffer from the cafeteria style catholic who wants their church to reflect them, instead of them reflecting their church. Where does this concept start? When does it begin? After working for 10 years in youth ministry, I can tell you it starts when we are all young. It begins when we are enabled to make choices which we are not prepared to make. Choices to quit our activities mid stream, choose our own circle of pals to hang around with and influence us, spend free time as we want, engage in unfiltered technology and ultimately choose if & how we want to participate in our faith.

Today our youth ages more slowly then in past generations. With children living at home longer, waiting longer to work and overall being supported as children well into their mid to late 20's. It strikes me as curious that we expect them to choose for themselves to attend Mass, attend church functions, participate in youth group or worse yet, to choose to do none of these.

Is having a good job when they get older or going to a good college more important then living eternally with Christ when we ultimately pass from this life? As parents we want what is best for our children, we never want to see them struggle or suffer, to battle with doubts and questions that life inevitably sends our way so we work hard to send them to good schools, provide food, shelter and a safe environment but what about the spiritual life of our children?

Youth Group is one function of this preparedness. It is but one training ground for good decision making, moral review, spiritual exploration and growth, or so that is the goal.

About 5 years ago I was ready to move on from this post. I thought this is what God wanted, but alas, as many of us know, our plans and God's Will do not always jive. Father took me to a diocesan wide youth ministry event. At this event I learned one extremely important thing...

"If your youth group does not faith share then all you're doing is serving pizza".

Well I can tell you the 1st five years of our parish youth group, I served a lot of pizza! That weekend when we met for your retreat team meeting I dove in, we as a team shared our faith. This was the point at which our Parish really got a youth group.

That retreat was the best one we had had up until then and since then each year, the group has grown and gotten deeper and deeper. This has translated from humble beginnings of a few team members and 20 or so students on retreat to now having 15 teens on team and retreat sometimes topping 40+ students.

The core reason for a Youth Group is to share our faith, explore, challenge, grow and become strong. When we talk openly about our prayer life, about the teachings of the church, and how we feel about these things we bond, grow, and become emboldened in the Spirit. We become One, Holy, Catholic & Apostolic (the marks of the church). We become the Church, Christ's bride here on earth.

So I say thank you, first of all. You who have youth in the group understand that the ministry of these students is a benefit to us adults as much or more then it is to them. To witness countless teens, cleaning yards of the elderly, serenading folks with Christmas Carols while freezing, selflessly dedicating hours and hours to plan retreats for their peers, and even standing up and proclaiming their love for Christ in witnessing to their friends. It is a truly an amazing and awe inspiring experience. I'm really not sure words can put into context the feeling I receive at the end of retreat having seen so many students connect with our Lord Jesus in a way they may not have before.

Yes retreats are typically emotional but I can attest that for some their lives are impacted for decades to come and for this I simply feel honored to be a part of it. I hope in reading this you will consider having your children attend and yourselves take an active role in this awesome group of students by volunteering to help.

Overall the goal of a Youth Group should be the same as any other group in our parish, to proclaim the belief and Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. But that can not be achieved without you. Without your support at home, without your encouragement to have your students attend our Lords Supper at Mass, without your active promotion of Youth Group events at home, without your active involvement in our parish.

Students learn from watching and doing. Recently I asked a few of the students what they would have liked to see from their parents. Their replies were shocking! They expressed to me that they wanted their parents to take active roles at Mass such as reading or Eucharistic Ministering, encourage participation at mass, ask questions about how they are doing Spiritually and more. I'm not sure when we as parents start getting scared of teens or when we think they are so different.

I often hear about how we need to "engage the youth" or how we need to "you know entertain them" or my favorite, "find someone who is younger and can connect with them". To this I say Hogwash! Like anyone else, teens want to be respected, loved, empowered, guided, listened too and overall treated like anyone else. The Word of God does not have to be dressed up or dressed down for that matter, the key to understanding teens is simply listening and asking questions. Regardless of age they simply want what you and I want, to be loved, to be part of something special, to be important, and to be cherished. All of which is what our faith and parish community can do for us.

Please pray for our youth group. Please pray to send us good leaders, please pray if that leader could be you. We would love your help and your leadership. You don't need a teen to work with the youth group, I don't have any.

AREA SHRINES

We are fortunate to live close to two religious shrines. The Shrine of Mariapoch is located on 17486 Mumford Road, Burton. As for background on this Shrine, travel back in time to the village of Povch Hungary in the year 1696. The Turks were besigging the land when a miracle occurred. A Greek Icon painting of Mary appeared to be shedding tears. Many miracles of healing occurred among the faithful who came to witness the miracle. No natural explanation for the tears could be found. The Turks ceased to be a threat and to honor the Weeping Icon of the Most Holy Mother of God, the town's name was changed to Mariapoch. In 1948 Pope Pius XII raised the status of the church in Mariapoch to the rank of Minor Basilica. Hungarians hold the original site very dear, and the Hungarians who came to Cleveland wished to Honor the Icon by having a shrine close by. In 1955 the land on Mumford Road was purchased and dedicated in 1956. The grounds have been developed for pilgrimage by the Byzantine Catholic Dioceses and the Social Mission Sisters. An annual pilgrimage is held in August. The Shrine is open to the public from the 1st Sunday in May to the last Saturday in Oct. and is one of the largest Hungarian Shrines in America. Just across the Ashtabula county line at 6601 Ireland Road in Windsor is the Servants of Mary Center for Peace. This "grass roots" shrine was first consecrated in July of 1992 to The Sacred and Immaculate Hearts. The first event there was held in a tent. Since then a 50' statue of Our Lady of Guadalupe has been constructed that overlooks a reflecting pond. Our Lady is 33 feet tall, one foot for each year of our Savior's life on earth. The base and metal rays around the statue combine to make the entire structure 50 feet tall. The statue is covered with nearly half a million colored mosaic tiles which were placed by volunteers. A fifteen decade rosary surrounds the reflecting pond and features a crystal crucifix with an almost life-size Christ. At night the Rosary is lit and is very inspiring. Other statuary is also found on the grounds. The peaceful atmosphere encourages meditation and prayer. The grounds house a Chapel and a Holy Innocents Chapel containing 3/4 size Fontanini nativity scene. Next to the main chapel stands a building containing bathrooms, a kitchen and dining/meeting room, and Catholic book store and gift shop all of which should be completed by April 2nd this year for the Grand Opening Day. The Shrine is already planning events for this summer including an Independence Celebration June 25, Fr. Larry Richards 8/21, Scott Hahn in September and much more. December will feature Bill Hixon, a former decorator of the White House at Christmas, and a visit from the Clauses. CATHOLIC CHARITIES




